



You Want Me to Do WHAT to My Knitting?!

An Introduction to Steeks

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HOMEWORK

NOTE: Have two of these completed before class begins.
Feel free to choose different patterns if you wish.

YARN

Worsted weight non-superwash yarn
Schoppel-Wool Reggae; 100% Merino wool,
109 yards per 50g ball (2 contrasting colors)

NEEDLES

Size US 8 (5.0 mm) DPNs or circular needle

Bring to class:

- 2 completed knitted tubes
- 12" zipper (or longer than length of knitted tube)
- Sewing needle
- Thread to match zipper
- Sharp scissors
- Crochet hook
- Length of contrasting yarn in similar weight
- 12" x 12" cotton fabric square

Make Two:

With MC, CO 62 sts. Join in round, being careful not to twist. PM to indicate beg of round. K 1 round with MC.

Choose your favorite chart, or design one of your own.

Keeping yarns in the *same order* throughout work, and reading chart from right to left, Join CC when needed and complete chart.

Cut CC, leaving a 6" tail. Continue work with MC.

K 1 round with MC.

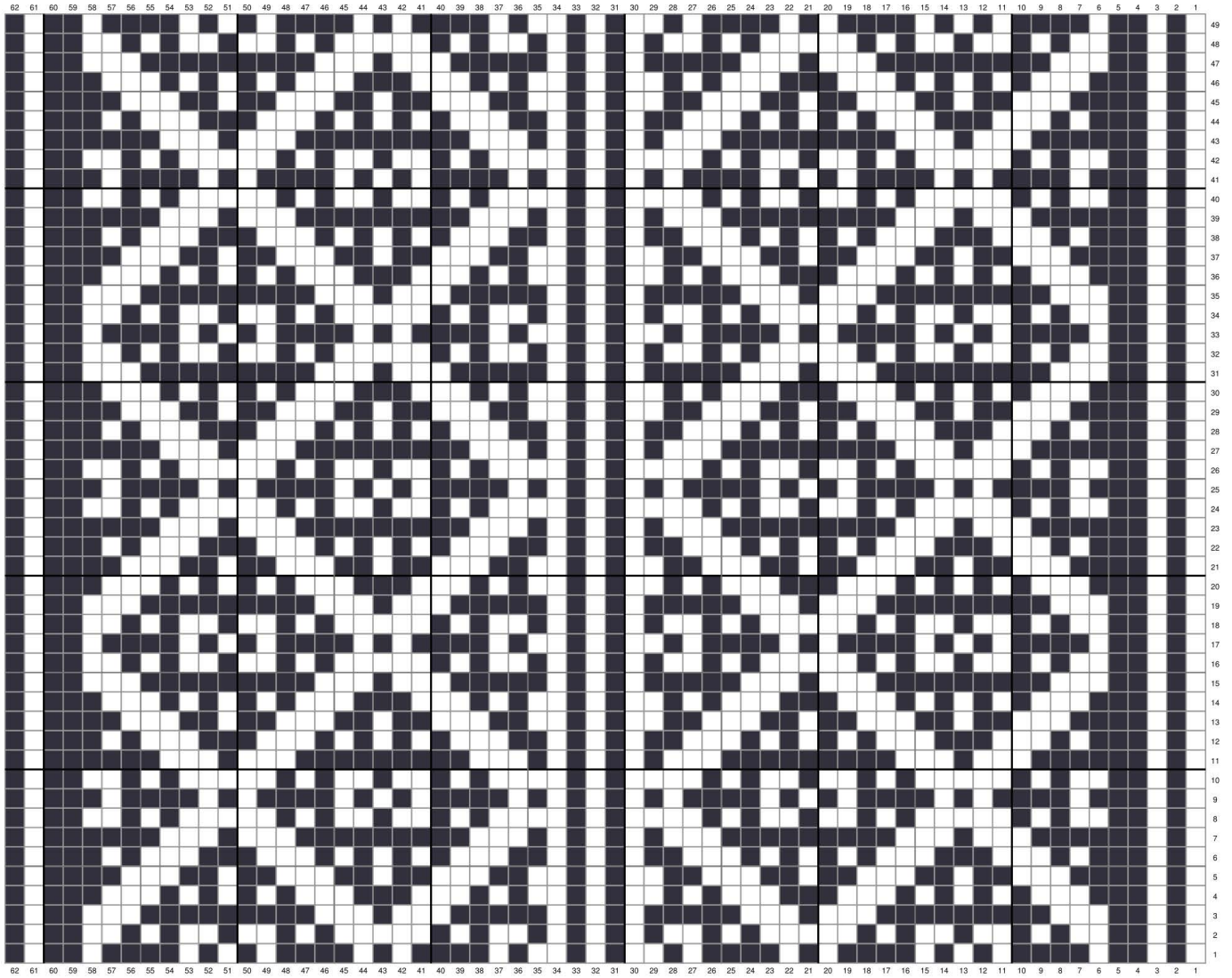
BO with MC. Cut yarn, leaving a 6" tail.

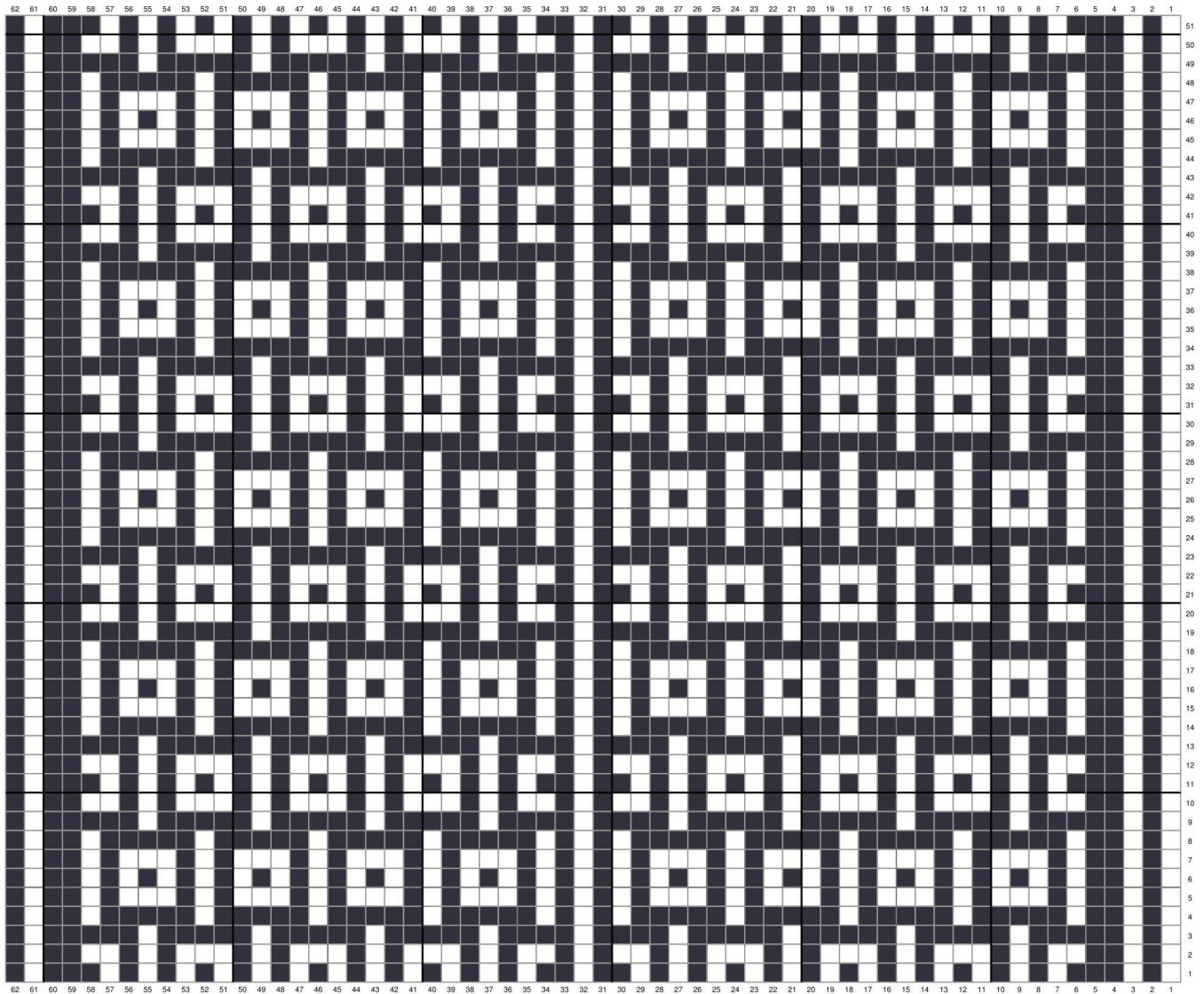




-  Knit with MC

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Chart Option B

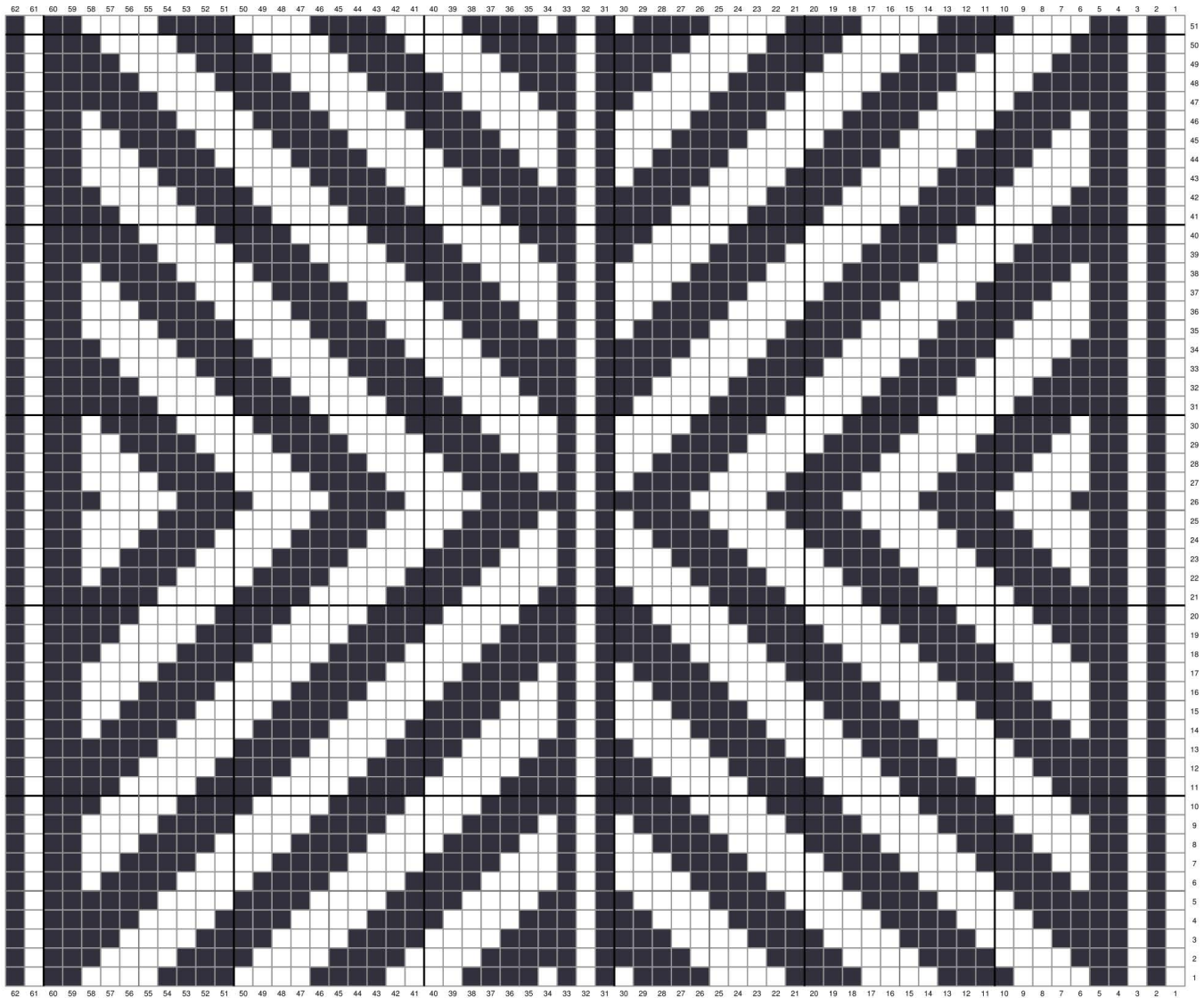

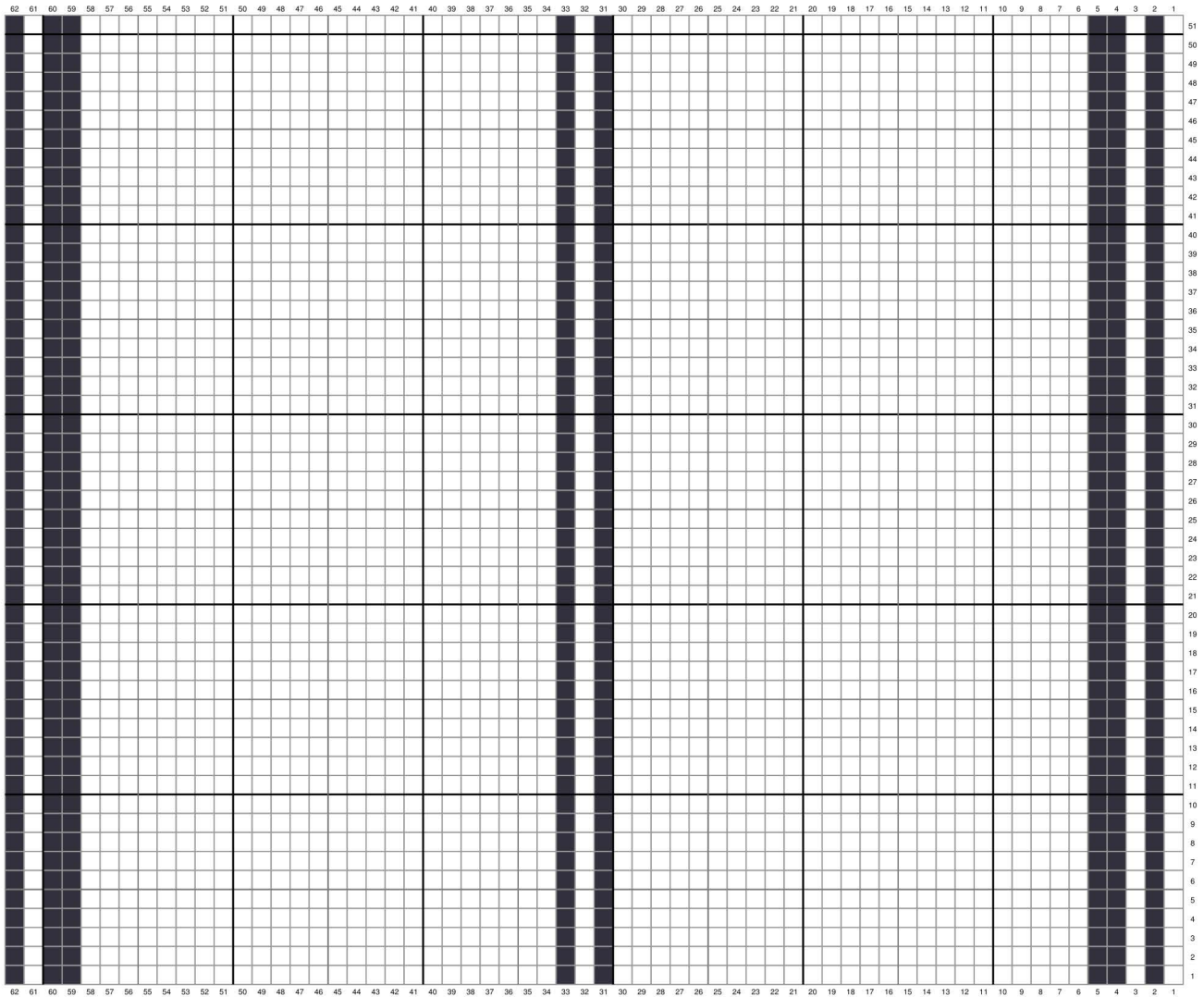
